Thank you and well done to FLC staff for their hard work and effort which placed the faculty in a good light.


I would also like to thank the editorial team for compiling and documenting the happenings at FLC throughout 2020 with three online newsletters and one special edition bulletin encapsulating the year.


UNIMAS signs MoU with Songkhla Rajabhat University



Collin Jerome (2020) A Place I Could Call My Own. *Indonesia and the Malay World*, 48:141, 247-260, DOI: 10.1080/13639811.2020.1751948

This article explores the meanings of 'home' for queer Malays in Malaysia through an analysis of the central gay Malay male character in Azwan Ismail's story, Tiada sesalan (No regrets). Drawing upon studies of home by feminist and queer geographers, the article examines the character's notions of 'home' and how these notions are constructed across time and space. The findings show that 'home' has been conceived of in many ways: as (1) a material-imaginative space; (2) a site of identity and power; and (3) a multi-scalar construct. The character has, for the most part of his life, been engaged in the process of queering home through which he developed a queer sense of 'home' and identity. This, however, has not been an easy task because the home is a powerful site that can both facilitate and complicate the process.

Malia Taibi and Teh Yin Na (2020) The Changes of Media Landscape in Malaysia: How Citizen Journalism Poses Threats to Traditional Media. *Jurnal Komunikasi*; Malaysian Journal of Communication, 36(1). pp. 369-380. ISSN 0128-1496

The rise of Internet and social media have provided alternative ways for people to access information. Communication technologies have given a new platform for ordinary people outside of the journalism profession to become content creators instead of content users. This gives rise to citizen journalism as ordinary people can publish, share, discuss and debate about news and stories in a global sphere with others. While some might view this trend as a positive way in disseminating information, citizen journalism is facing numerous criticism as people are questioning their credibility regarding the news sources and the ethical code of practice that they use when collecting information. This study aims to highlight the changes taking place in Malaysian media landscape in response to citizen journalism as well as the threats towards mainstream journalism. Data was collected through a qualitative in-depth interview method with five journalists working in the mainstream news organizations in Malaysia. All respondents have vast experience in journalism, both in traditional newsroom and online news portal setting. The results indicated that changes occurring in the media landscape are due to several reasons namely instant gratification of news; changed mode of transmission; new styles of news writing; open and freer media environment and change of gate-keeping process. Threats posed by citizen journalism to traditional media are commercial impact, stealing of credits and stiff competition. It was concluded that newsrooms and journalists have to change in order to face the challenges posed by citizen journalism.

The increasing call for students to be equipped with 21st-century skills has prompted many academic programmes in tertiary learning institutions to revise their core focus particularly in their learning delivery and assessments. This study reports on the incorporation of challenge-based assessments in the Language and Computing course offered in a Linguistics undergraduate programme in a Malaysian university. In particular, the key tenets of challenge-based assessments are embedded within a gamified learning environment, in which the students are assessed progressively through a series of challenges. The course was run for 14 weeks with 68 students. By the end of the course, the students were required to evaluate their overall experience through a questionnaire. The findings showed that the novel use of challenge-based assessments has sustained students' interest in the course. Moreover, observable behavioural changes were also apparent such as the increase in attendance rate and active discussions in face-to-face classes. The students' perceptions regarding the whole course were notably positive with high ratings given to the constructs covered in the questionnaire. Ultimately, this case study provided valuable insights on how gamified challenge-based assessments can enhance students' engagement and deep learning.

Poor mental health of university students is becoming a serious issue in many countries. Malaysia - a leading country for Asia-Pacific education - is one of them. Despite the government's effort to raise awareness, Malaysian students' mental health remains challenging, exacerbated by the students' negative attitudes towards mental health (mental health attitudes). Relatedly, self-compassion and resilience have been reported to improve mental health and mental health attitudes. Malaysian students (n = 153) responded to paperbased measures about mental health problems, negative mental health attitudes, selfcompassion, and resilience. Scores were compared with 105 UK students, who also suffered from poor mental health and negative mental health attitudes, to make a cross-cultural comparison, to contextualise Malaysian students' mental health status, using t tests (aim 1). Correlation, path, and moderation analyses were conducted, to evaluate the relationships among these mental health constructs (aim 2). Malaysian students scored higher on mental health problems and negative mental health attitudes, and lower on self-compassion and resilience than UK students. Mental health problems were positively associated with negative mental health attitudes, and negatively associated with self-compassion and resilience. While self-compassion mediated the relationship between negative mental health attitudes and mental health problems (high selfcompassion weakened the impacts of negative mental health attitudes on mental health problems), resilience did not moderate the same relationship (the level of resilience did not influence the impact of negative mental health attitudes on mental health problems). Self-compassion training was suggested to counter the challenging mental health in Malaysian university students.




Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) Education Award UNIMAS-Utsunomiya University EduTour programme


